

Building Code Exemptions







Current legislation

The Engineers and Geoscience Professions Act (EGP Act) describes activities that constitute the practices of engineering and geoscience and require that, except as otherwise provided in the EGP Act, no individual or entity shall engage in the practice of engineering and geoscience unless licensed with APEGA.





Current Legislation

There are a number of building code-related exemptions in the *EGP Act* that allow individuals and entities to engage in the practice of engineering without being licensed with APEGA if the activity relates to buildings of a certain type, size and occupancy.





Current Situation

- The Alberta Building Code (ABC) contains exemptions that relate to buildings of certain type, size and occupancy.
- The *EGP Act* and *Architects Act* of Alberta both contain exemptions that relate to buildings of certain type, size and occupancy and both share wording from the 1982 ABC.
- The wording introduced into the *EGP Act* and the *Architects Act* is not exactly the same wording used in the 1982 ABC.





Proposed Change



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 Repeal the building code exemptions in the EGP Act and reference the current Alberta Building Code as the source for relevant exemptions.





Rationale

- Exemptions in multiple pieces of legislation is confusing and a potential risk to public safety.
- Public interest is better served because it would be clear that the most current version of the ABC is the sole source of relevant exemptions.
- Building structures and building science have evolved since the 1980s. It will be easier to make changes to building code exemptions in the future, which will better protect the public.
